IN CONVERSATION WITH

The librarian is not just someone who can tell you where the newly released Colleen Hoover book is, but is someone who can recommend companions in the form of books with whom you can traverse adventures and thrills.

With this in mind, we interviewed Ms. Sapna Mary Mathew, our school librarian, in which she shares her journey and experience through the years.

You have been the librarian for this school ever since its conception. What are some of the milestones you have seen the library mark?

The UCPS library has undergone many changes. The increase in the number of books, the improvement in the reading capabilities of children, and activities like the book fair by Kids Today, library week, and scholastic book sales through pamphlets, have brought excitement to the students' lives.

Has readership among children increased over the years? What are some genres students are avidly interested in? Why do you think those genres are most attractive to students?

I can divide the reading habits of children into before COVID-19 and after COVID-19. It was when I saw a lot of changes in my own reading habits. The primary kids, especially the average readers, now read anything from fairy tales to small mystery books. The middle school children are more interested in books with illustrations, like Geronimo Stilton and Tom Gates. The teenagers, who used to read normal novels before, started asking for self-help books, mythological books, and biographies.

This drastic change was interesting to see. The main reason for this change, I think, is due to the new book-tomovie adaptations that have seen a sharp increase in recent years, and children, as a result, are eager to read these stories that they see on screen.

What is your favourite aspect of being a librarian, and how has this experience been?

My experience as a librarian so far has been a challenging task, since UCPS is a growing school. However, it is a rewarding one. Nothing is more exciting than when children come and tell me, proudly, that they have read a certain book, sharing with me its pros and cons. It is always a wonderful feeling when the students who have graduated visit, and fill me in on their achievements in the outside world as pure professionals.

You not only serve the role of a librarian, but also a close mentor for numerous students, both past and present.

How have students transformed into who they are now by using the library?

As a librarian for classes 1 to 12, I would call myself privileged to see my students come into UCPS as a child of 6 years and leave school as mature young adults, ready to tackle the challenges of the world, while being equipped with the weapon of knowledge that the library has provided them with. Students come into the library to have a peaceful place to sit and read or even at times to talk their hearts out so that they can get their thoughts straight, which I believe plays a vital role in shaping the type of people they want to be. The library is a place free of judgement, and you can share your thoughts and opinions, and listen to those of others.'

Going back to your roots, where and what did you study in college? What was the moment you decided you wanted to be a librarian?

I did my master's in Home Science from Kerala University. At that time, I had the opportunity to do my research work in the university library. It was huge with long halls filled with rows and rows of books on strong wooden shelves. What fascinated me the most was the sheer number of books that looked down upon us from those shelves, the number of researchers who sat in the library and read on, and the silence they maintained religiously, immersed in their books. That was when the thought of being a librarian got cemented in my mind, after which there was no turning back, and the rest is history.

Lastly, what are some of the things that you would recommend students do to take full advantage of the library?

The library is a place, peaceful and quiet and most suitable for reading books with full concentration. Children should remember that not only story books but magazines with different topics are available in the library. Question papers, question banks, and guides are all helpful and readily available for you to ace your exams, and act as an aid to guide you into a bright future.

Ms. Sapna Mary Mathew has been the librarian for the Union Christian Public School Library ever since its conception in 2015. She has worked as a teacher in the UCA institution of schools for the past 15 years. She grew up reading all the Enid Blyton, Nancy Drew, and the Hardy Boys books like any other person of her age at that time, and she devours an Agatha Christie novel at any place, day, or time. An enthusiastic storyteller, a dear companion, and a wise mentor, she is an adored teacher by all the students.

As the exam season approaches, students enter a period of intense practice and study. Essential for effective practice is gaining insight into what lies ahead. We conducted an interview with our school's highest achiever, Rinnah Evangeline, who provides valuable advice on the dos and don'ts while dealing with stress.

Were you ever distracted while studying? How did you stay motivated to work hard?

Yes, indeed. I would want to watch a movie, or start a series, or read a book only when I open my textbook. And most of the time I gave in to temptation. But wanting to see an A+ on my report card was my motivation.

What are some studying techniques you used to learn subjects like social science, maths, and science?

Science and maths were moderately easy because all I had to do was understand the concept and apply it. But social science? No matter how many times the teacher tells you to write down the key points, there are always going to be plenty of dates and places that you have to memorise. And it was difficult. But I got the hang of it after writing a couple of cycle tests

Since you self-studied, what are some study materials and resources that you used?

I didn't use many aids in 10th grade. I only watched a couple of videos for chemistry and physics of Khan Academy.

They simplify it for you so that you can grasp it quickly. I used 'RD Sharma' guides for Math, and it was extremely helpful.

What would you say was the most important thing you did that helped you study and score well?

I was thorough with the NCERT textbook. And I only started doing past question papers in the last few months, say from January. What really helped me was all the revision questions done in class. Solving sample question papers prepares you for the boards. The SQPs are tougher than the actual board exam question paper. So, if you're able to do them quite easily, then you're good to go.

Looking back at times of preparation and studying, what are some things you've learnt from the experience?

I learnt that I shouldn't procrastinate. I started studying a week before any test and sometimes I'd start the day before. I would suggest you revise every day's portions regularly. And if I'm studying, I try my best to focus. Parental pressure was something every one of us faced, but don't let it get to you. Just relax, the preparation for the exam might be difficult, with a lot of sleepless nights. But the board exams? They aren't as scary as you think. Just have your mind cleared of stress and calm through the chaos, and you're pretty much all prepared!

Rinnah Evangeline stood first as the school topper during the year 2023-24 for the All-India Secondary School Examination conducted by CBSE. She scored a whopping 484/500 and held the position for being the topper in English. Having chosen the PCB + Mathematics group, she aims to become a doctor and is currently undergoing NEET coaching.




MATHEMATICAL MERRIMENT: FESTIVE FUSION OF SHAPES AND PATTERNS


